2015 has been another successful year for Southampton & District Branch, during which we have welcomed a range of speakers presenting a good variety of talks. I am delighted that we have maintained a good attendance at all meetings, and as has become a regular occurrence in recent years, visiting speakers have complimented the branch on the number of people present. New members are the lifeblood of the branch, and during the year we have gained a number of new regular attendees; this is particularly encouraging and let us hope that this healthy trend continues and that we are able to welcome more people to our throng during the coming year.

Keeping our activities in the public eye is very important, and thanks particularly to Ivor's efforts as Shows & Displays Manager we have mounted promotional displays at three well-attended events during the year. Vinay's efforts to provide an up-to-date branch website are also a valuable tool for the branch, and ensures that anyone who wants to contact us or attend our meetings can easily find all the information they need.

I have been busy in recent weeks putting together a programme of events for the coming year, and copies of the finished programme will be available at the December branch meeting. In addition to our regular monthly meetings, two of our members will be holding an open day and garden party, providing opportunities to admire their collections and for all of us to spend a few informal hours together..... time to chat is always limited at our regular meetings! We shall also be arranging car-share visits to the biennial Havering Cactus Mart (at which there will approx. 14 nurseries from around the country selling plants), to Lullingstone Castle and gardens near Dartford (where one of the BCSS patrons, Tom Hart-Dyke, has a cactus and succulent collection, along with his world garden and country house), to the Oxford Branch Show (which is one of the very best branch shows in the country, with magnificent plants on display, and with specialist Mammillaria classes organised by the Mammillaria Society), and to the biennial event of the Mesemb Study Group in Banstead, Surrey (where there are

always many impressive plants on display, along with a good selection of sales plants from their members and other sellers).

The major event of 2016 will undoubtedly be the BCSS National Show on August 20th, to be held again at the Wood Green Animal Shelter in Godmanchester (near Huntingdon). National shows are held every four years and are not to be missed! There will be many hundreds of magnificent plants to admire in the show, and a huge selection of nurseries selling a vast range of plants. Among the sellers will be a number of overseas nurseries offering both cacti and succulents, many of which are not freely available for sale in the UK. I know that numerous members of the branch attend National Shows, but many arrange accommodation in the area to avoid driving such a long distance in one day, so arranging car share opportunities to attend the show is not so easy. However, Portsmouth Branch will be arranging a coach to the event, and they have generously offered free seats on the coach to any of our members who would like to join them... all you have to do is get to Portsmouth in time to climb aboard the coach. I will have more details about their planned coach trip in due course.

I am looking forward already to next year's programme of events, but in the meantime would like to wish everyone a very happy Christmas and New Year. See you at our January meeting on Jan 5th, when we will have a number of short talks from members on a range of interesting topics.

The Branch continues to maintain a very comfortable savings and current account balance of £7,392.

Display Manager's Report

Sparsholt Countryside Day - May 16th

Our first show of the year was held in the same position as last year. We were lucky with the weather as it was dry - but it was a bit windy and once we had erected the gazebo we were alright. This year the show was spread over a larger area with most of the refreshments in the field opposite the show entrance. Because the field behind the library only had a few food stalls, we did not get as many visitors to our display as in previous years and plant sales were a bit down. Still, it was a nice show to take part in and we all enjoyed it. My thanks to Ted, Bruce, and Peter for their help.

The New Forest Show - July 28th-30th

All branch members arrived early on Monday to help arrange the display and sale plants. The weather over the four days was dry and apart from a very brief shower on Monday, it was hot and very sunny. I am pleased to say the marquee was cool with a good flow of air. Our display did not do so well this year and we only received a silver gilt prize card. I did not think the display was as good as last year but I think we will have a better display if we can make an effort to have clean pots - the judges mentioned that it was the pots that let us down our display. Next year I will try to bring cleaning materials so we can check and clean the pots before they are put in place. We do not receive any prize money for our display but we should all show pride in the display. Plant sales were good so the event was well worth doing. I would like to thank everyone who helped put up the display and acted as stewards during the show days.

Romsey Show - September 12th

We all arrived at the show on set up day (Friday 11th) to put up the back cloth and arrange the display plants. I was pleased the weather was dry, this made getting to the marquee easy, not like last year when it was very muddy. On Saturday we had to arrive early as no exhibitor cars are allowed in after 8am. Our display was being judged from 9am to 10am so we had a chance to walk around the show - unfortunately it started to drizzle with rain and this lasted until midday. The show was well supported. Our sales were a down a bit, but I think this was due to having another cactus and succulent display in the marquee. We won a gold medal and prize money and this event was well worth doing.

Branch Table Show

The number of people participating during the year went up slightly from 10 to 12, with two new members entering (Mrs M Stevenson and Mr A Mant). The Cacti and Succulent in Flower class had good support. Most of our members grow nice plants, it is a shame they do not bring them along to the meetings where we can see and enjoy them. I hope 2016 will be the year you will support our Table Show

For those of you who do not know, anyone can bring plants for the sales table, just make sure each plant has a price label with your initials on. We charge a 10% commission at branch meetings and 15% at shows.

Last Month's Meeting

Zone 11 Quiz

At the start of the meeting, David explained that the questions had been set by myself and Richard, and that three teams of three people from each of the branches would compete for the Mealy bug trophy – the audience collectively would also count as a fourth team.

Unfortunately a few of our regular members were absent, so our meeting attendance was lower than it has been for other recent meetings, although it was nice to see several visitors from Portsmouth and the Isle of Wight. Anyway a surprise awaited some of our members who found themselves promoted to the quiz team! The 3 teams were as follows:

Isle of Wight:

Anthony Mitchell, Ron Mitchell, Stephen Woods

Southampton:

David Neville, Ben Turner and Carol Weston

Portsmouth:

Cliff Thompson, Terry Mead, Gordon Arnold

We started off the first half of the quiz by asking the questions in a clockwise direction, with round one asking the names of prominent BCSS officials. Isle of Wight failed to name the secretary, offering David Kirkbright and Southampton got some bonus points by stating that it was Eddy Harris. The others questions were answered successfully, with Alice in the audience being well aware of the name of the BCSS treasurer. The next round consisted of some more questions about the Society, and Isle of Wight correctly named the 2 societies that merged in 1983 to form the current BCSS. Southampton guessed that the number of branches in the country was 85, which was close enough to the correct answer of 80. Portsmouth got the membership fee for associates

correct (£4) and the audience knew the name of the quarterly journal (Cactus World).

In Round 3, the teams were given the second part of the names of 3 species of cacti and asked to name the genus they belonged to. The three branch teams got their answers correct, but the audience failed to realise that *gracilis*, *pilosus* and *robustus* implied *Ferocactus*. Round 4 asked some facts about cacti. When asked about the tallest cactus in existence, Isle of Wight nominated *Carnegiea* but that was wrong and Southampton got more bonus points with *Pachycereus pringlei*. Richard shed some more light on the answer by mentioning that there had once been a larger *Carnegiea* but it had toppled over. The smallest cactus was correctly named as *Blossfeldia liliputana*, and Portsmouth correctly identified that the US state where the Saguaro is protected by law is Arizona. When asked about the state flower of Arizona, no one in the audience seemed to know, so they offered the rather unlikely answer of “daffodil” and Isle of Wight duly got a bonus point.

Round 5 was some general knowledge, and when asked the most common first name in the world, Isle of Wight thought it was either Chang or Mohammed and they chose the former - and were wrong. Southampton got the bonus points by choosing Mohammed and also got their own question about the most common surname correct (Chan/Chang). Portsmouth correctly named abnormally low blood pressure as hypotension. The audience did not know what organ Bright’s disease affected and guessed liver, and so there were again some bonus points for the Isle of Wight who suggested kidneys.

Round 6 was some sporting questions asking where the 1948 Olympics and 2010 Winter Olympics were held. Portsmouth got asked how many players were in an Australian rules football team and this question was passed all the way round the hall, with no one getting close to the correct answer of 18. The audience did correctly answer that the football team Benfica is based in Portugal. After 6 rounds, the scores were audience 3, Portsmouth 5, Isle of Wight 5, and Southampton 9.

Round 7 involved comparing metric and imperial measurements and I am glad to say all 4 questions were answered correctly. Round 8 asked when the TV Soaps Coronation Street, EastEnders, Emmerdale Farm and Neighbours were first broadcast, with answers needing to be within a couple of years of the correct year. The teams did reasonably well, with just one question having to be passed on. The next round was similar, asking when some long standing BBC programmes - The Sky at Night, Match of the Day, Panorama and Blue Peter -

were first broadcast. Some of the teams struggled but Isle of Wight did particularly well, getting 3 answers right out of the four in the round – and this was despite the fact that Anthony doesn’t have a TV set! Round 10 involved definition of botanical terms - dioecious (different sexed flowers on different plants), caespitose (tufted or densely clustered), cleistogamous (flowers self- set seed without opening), zygomorphic (flowers have one plane of symmetry).

Round 11 involved some more definitions of botanical terms - adventitious, androgynous, campanulate, and dichotomous, and Anthony’s knowledge of latin helped Isle of Wight to pick up a bonus. Round 12 involved naming the flower colours of specified cacti, and all the teams answered this correctly. Richard provided an update to the scores - the audience had 9, Portsmouth had 8, Southampton had 14 and the Isle of Wight had surged into the lead with 15. It was now time for the mid-meeting break and to enjoy the food and refreshments that the branch had laid on.

After the break, questions were asked in the anti-clockwise direction. Rounds 13 and 14 asked for the time difference between London and other cities, in Europe and further afield. The teams did reasonably well with Europe and USA, but struggled with cities which were further away, although Isle of Wight again picked up some bonus points. Round 15 asked teams to name which seeds were larger between named pairs of cacti/succulent genera, and all teams answered these correctly. Rounds 16 and 17 probed at the team’s knowledge of the *Guide to Shows*. Which group would you show *Ficus*, *Bulbine*, *Hoya*, *Oxalis/Begonia* in? And similarly which mesemb subgroup would you show *Lapidaria*, *Ophthalmophyllum*, *Pleiospilos*, and *Glottiphyllum* in? Portsmouth and the audience failed to pick up any points in these two rounds. Round 19 asked for the capitals of certain South American countries and all 4 teams answered correctly. Richard provided us with updated scores - Portsmouth had 10 points, the audience had 13, Southampton had 22 and Isle of Wight were still in the lead with 24.

For Round 19, we required the teams to name which country and locality some relatively recent cactus and succulent discoveries (*Agave albopilosa*, *Yavia cryptocarpa*, *Mammillaria leuthyi*, *Geohintonia mexicana*) were found. Round 20 was general knowledge regarding movies/TV, and round 21 asked where certain vegetables originated. Tesco/Aldi/Lidl was immediately offered but of course we were looking for the country or region where the plants were first grown. We learnt that cucumbers come from India, radishes from China,

lettuce from the eastern Med and Egypt, and carrots from Iran and Afghanistan.

Rounds 22 and 23 required the teams to give us the old names for some countries in Africa and Asia - geography was obviously a strong point, with all the teams doing well and getting their answers right for both rounds. Round 24 required the teams to information about the flags of various European countries - they had to provide the colours in the right order and also state whether the stripes were horizontal or vertical. It was a bit of a struggle, but the teams did manage to pick up some points here.

David mentioned that that clock was approaching 10pm and we decided to go through one more round. This was a question about leaf shapes and the definitions of clavate, crenulated, falcate and uncinata. Portsmouth picked up a bonus point here. Richard announced the final scores which proved to be quite interesting. Portsmouth and the Audience were tied on 19 points each and Southampton and the Isle of Wight were also tied on 31 points each. So we decided to have a sudden death question. "Who is 4th in line to the throne?" We received answers of Harry and George, but these were both wrong – the correct answer was the recently born Charlotte. So another tie break was required. "What is the difference - in years - between the reigns of Queen Elizabeth 2nd and Queen Victoria?" - Southampton answered with 0 years – the story about the Queen's reign equalling Queen Victoria's was in the news a couple of months ago – so **Southampton** were declared the **winners!**

The meeting ended with Cliff Thompson thanked Southampton for hosting the event and for the catering, and for making it an enjoyable evening overall. There was also a call for applause for Glenn and Teresa who had provided the food and refreshments for us all.
